

EXPLANATION OF THE VOTING RECORD

The issues listed are issues on which the Iowa Federation of Labor, AFL-CIO, has taken a positive position at our Annual Conventions. The Legislative Resolutions passed at recent conventions have dealt with the subject matter in the issues listed. We have compiled the voting record on the basis of action taken by the delegates at these conventions.

The vote is taken from the official Journals of both Houses of the General Assembly, where the vote is recorded as yes, no or absent. We show this vote as Wrong (W) or Right (R) or Absent (A) vote.

In the explanation of the issues we indicate why a no vote might be a right (R) vote on one issue and a wrong (W) vote on another issue. Where a Legislator is listed as voting right (R) on an issue you will find that he has voted the position of the Iowa Labor Movement. Where they are listed as voting wrong (W) you will find they voted in opposition to our legislative resolutions.

It is difficult to get an accurate appraisal of the support of an individual legislator for our I.F.L. Program in an Assembly where most of our legislative proposals died in committee. We do feel by showing the vote on some key amendments to the bills, as well as the vote on final passage a more meaningful evaluation can be made. This we have attempted to do.

We suggest that you study this record to find out how your Legislators voted and decide for yourself whether or not their record warrants our support. If not, we urge that you start looking for a replacement for these people.

The district numbers used are the former county or multi-county districts that your Senators were elected from in 1966 and 1968. In 1970 the size of the Legislature will be reduced to fifty Senators and one hundred House members with newly assigned district numbers.

EXPLANATION OF THE ISSUES

ISSUE 1. Sales Tax Credit. Senate File 286.

Repealed the sales tax credit to Iowan's making less than \$7,000.00 a year. This amounted to a tax increase of \$33,000,000.00 during the

biennium on the low income workers in Iowa. The AFL-CIO has always worked for a tax structure based on ability to pay and as the sales credit was repealed in the same session that repealed the 3 percent tax on advertising and new construction, benefiting the rich, our position was against passage. Bill passed Senate. 40 yes, 17 no, 4 absent. February 25, 1969 (Senate Journal 371-372). Bill passed House. 83 yes, 38 no, 3 absent. February 26, 1969 (House Journal 441). A no vote shown as right (R).

ISSUE 2. Dirksen Amendment. Senate Concurrent Resolution 13.

This Resolution urges Congress to call a National Constitutional Convention to allow states to apportion one house of their Legislatures on factors other than population. This would deny equal representation to the workers in Iowa and circumvent the now constitutionally required principle of one-man, one-vote. Fair and equitable apportionment will continue to be our goal. We opposed passage of this Resolution. Resolution passed Senate. 39 yes, 20 no, 2 absent. April 7, 1969 (Senate Journal 776). Resolution passed House. (70 yes, 53 no, 1 absent. April 30, 1969 (House Journal 1343). A no vote shown as right (R).

ISSUE 3. Election Law. Senate File 665.

This bill as originally introduced and passed by the Senate in 1969 would have disenfranchised many Iowa voters. The bill restricted student voting, purged lists of registered voters every three years instead of every four years, and abolished mobile registrars. The I.F.L. has always believed the strength of a democracy depended on the fullest possible participation in politics of its citizens. We opposed passage of this bill. Bill passed Senate. 36 yes, 12 no, 13 absent. May 1, 1969 (Senate Journal 1280). A no vote shown as right (R).

ISSUE 4. Reapportionment. House File 781.

A law to reduce the size of the Iowa House to 100 members and the Iowa Senate to 50 members. The Legislature amended a fourteen member bipartisan committee reapportionment plan until it had a

population variance 7.6 percent. We felt a good faith effort to achieve equal representation had not been made, and the plan fell short of the one-man, one-vote principle set forth by the Supreme Court. After passage the Iowa Supreme Court held this plan to be unconstitutional, but allowed it to stand for the 1970 elections. We opposed passage because we believed a fairer plan could have been adopted. Passed Senate. 40 yes, 20 no, 1 absent. April 28, 1969. (Senate Journal 1195). Passed House. 83 yes, 41 no. April 16, 1969 (House Journal 1042). A no vote shown as right (R).

ISSUE 5. Workmen's Compensation. Senate File 1281.

This bill improves the Workmen's Compensation law by making law compulsory, providing for nursing care, increasing burial expense to \$1,000.00, increases weekly disability and healing period benefits and provided for rehabilitation benefits. We supported passage. Bill passed Senate. 56 yes, 0 no, 5 absent. March 5, 1970 (Senate Journal 857). Passed House. 110 yes, 0 no, 14 absent. March 30, 1970 (House Journal 1242). A yes vote shown as right (R).

ISSUE 6. Collective Bargaining. Senate File 1084.

Lucken amendment, Division 3, called for the union to pay 50 percent of the public employer expenses and wages while engaged in collective bargaining. This amendment was designed to discourage public employee bargaining. We opposed passage. Failed to pass Senate. 20 yes, 33 no, 7 absent, 1 present. A no vote shown as right (R).

ISSUE 7. Collective Bargaining. Senate File 1084.

Lucken-Kosek amendment to allow individual bargaining. This would have made collective bargaining impossible. Passed Senate. 33 yes, 23 no, 5 absent. Was rescinded later by voice vote on motion by Senator Frommelt. We opposed passage. A no vote shown as right (R).

ISSUE 8. Collective Bargaining. Senate File 1084

Lucken-Leonard amendment that would have required a 60 percent majority of those voting in a referendum to raise the amount neces-

sary to fund the proposed collective bargaining agreement. We opposed passage for obvious reasons. Failed to pass Senate. 21 yes, 33 no, 7 absent. A no vote shown as right (R).

ISSUE 9. Collective Bargaining. Senate File 1084.

This bill establishes the right of all public employees to bargain collectively on the same basis that is enjoyed by employees in private industry. In spite of amendments adopted prohibiting strikes and political activities, we supported passage. Vote is on final passage. Passed Senate. 47 yes, 11 no, 3 absent. April 1, 1970. Senate Journal 1163). A yes vote shown as right (R).

ISSUE 10. Child Labor. House File 1251.

This bill revises the child labor law. The Act is designed to protect persons under 18 years of age from occupations considered hazardous. Better control of child labor is facilitated by providing for the issuance of work permits by local school officials before the obtaining of a job. The Bureau of Labor with assistance of local law enforcement agencies is responsible for the enforcement of the Act. A committee on child labor is established to make rules and regulations declaring occupations to be either safe or hazardous to life or limb. We felt the Act contained the necessary protection and supported passage. Vote shown is for final passage. 57 yes, 0 no, 4 absent. April 3, 1970 (Senate Journal 1211). Passed House. 101 yes, 14 no, 9 absent. February 20, 1970 (House Journal 597).

ISSUE 11. Secondary Boycotts. House File 1118.

This bill prohibits any state agency or political subdivision from refusing to purchase goods or services of any person or corporations to show sympathy or to influence the outcome of any labor dispute. As there was nothing in the bill to prevent state agencies from purchasing goods and services to show sympathy for the employers involved in a labor dispute, we opposed passage. Bill passed House, 75 yes, 46 no, 3 absent. March 4, 1970 (House Journal 748). A no vote shown as right (R).
