- 39) House Amendment H-3796 to S. F. 373 - Unemployment Bill. Would have in the event of a voluntary quit kept the succeeding employer from having his insurance rate raised in the event it was necessary for him to lay off that employee.

- 43) House Amendment H-3728 to S. F. 373 - Unemployment Bill. Would have provided an employer not to contribute to the trust fund in the event he had no claims for twenty quarters instead of forty.

- 44) House Amendment H-3788 to S. F. 373 - Unemployment Bill. Would have allowed employers with an increase in employees to remain at the same contribution rate up to eight calendar quarters.

- 4) Amendment S-3230 to S. F. 373 - Unemployment Bill. Increased wage credits to one-half, instead of individuals total wage credits accrued in a factory closing.
No vote - IFL position Ayes 24 - Nays 23 - Absent 4
- 5) Amendment S-3223D to S. F. 373 - Unemployment Bill. Lowered qualifications for benefits from 1½ times high quarter wages to \$600 high quarter and \$300 other quarter.

- 6) Amendment S-3223E to S. F. 373 - Unemployment Bill. Removed the one week waiting period.
