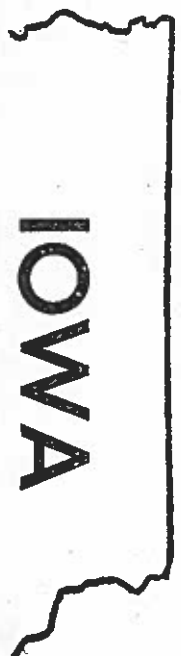

Dear Sisters and Brothers:

Enclosed is a copy of the Voting Record of both the Senators and Representatives of the 61st General Assembly of Iowa; also an Explanation of the votes which we have listed.

The issues that are listed are issues in which the Iowa Federation of Labor has taken a positive position throughout the years in our Annual Convention. Many of the legislative resolutions passed in past conventions have dealt with the subject matter listed in these issues in this Voting Record, and we have compiled the votes on the basis of action taken by delegates at these conventions. Where a legislator is listed as voting "RIGHT" on an issue, you will find that he has voted the position of the Iowa Labor Movement. Where they are listed as voting "WRONG" you will find that it is opposite the position of our legislative resolutions. You will also note that in two issues listed in both the Senate and the House Voting Records, all of these legislators were listed as voting "RIGHT." These are in the Senate Voting Record as Issues No. 3 and No. 10, and in the House Voting Record as Issues No. 8 and No. 12. The first one was the Industrial Safety Bill, which was a compromise bill and was worked out to where there wasn't any opposition expressed against the bill when it was finally voted on. The second one was the Fair Employment Practices Act which, again, was worked out to the satisfaction of everyone.

On most of the other issues, you will find there was a considerable difference in the way a number of legislators voted on the various issues. We suggest that you study this record to find how the legislators you helped to elect voted on all of these controversial measures; decide for yourself whether or not their record warrants our continued support. We have made no effort to rate these people other than to give you the actual voting record. We suggest, again, that you study it and decide whether there are enough votes listed "RIGHT" to justify their being retained to represent us in the Iowa Legislature. If not, it is not too early to start looking around for replacements for the people who do not justify our support.

EXPLANATION OF SENATE VOTING RECORD

- NUMBER 1**—The Schroeder Amendment to Senate File 21. Originally, Senate File 21 would have eliminated the waiting period in the Unemployment Compensation Law so as to allow an unemployed person to receive unemployment compensation during the first week of unemployment. This amendment allows for the collection of the first week of unemployment if a person is eligible for unemployment compensation for five consecutive weeks.
- NUMBER 2**—Senate File 21, as amended by the Schroeder Amendment explained in Number 1 above, and does allow payment for the first week of unemployment after five consecutive weeks of eligibility.
- NUMBER 3**—Senate File 403, the Industrial Safety Bill, which establishes a State Safety Commission comprised of four people representing employees, four people representing employers, construction projects, and provides for the enforcement of these safety codes by the State Labor Commissioner.
- NUMBER 4**—Senate File 568 provides for the redistricting of the Iowa Legislature more nearly on a true population basis. While leaving the House of Representatives as it is at present, it establishes a Senate of 61 members, giving the more populous counties more representation and taking some of the representation away from some of the more sparsely populated districts, changing the population factor in the Senate from 38% to approximately 47%. This is the Temporary Reapportionment Plan and will be in effect until the Constitutional Amendment explained in Number 12 of this voting record is adopted, or until this redistricting plan is changed by the Iowa Legislature.
- NUMBER 5**—House File 24, which was known as the Anti-strikebreakers Bill. This act prohibits the hiring of professional strikebreakers, along with making it illegal for professional strikebreakers to offer themselves for hire in the state of Iowa where a labor dispute exists, and also makes it illegal for an employment agency to procure replacements for employers during a strike, along with prohibiting a person to advertise for employers to replace strikers without putting in an advertisement that there is a strike in progress.
- NUMBER 6**—Amendment to House File 42. A bill to provide increased benefits in Unemployment Compensation. This amendment discussed here was the Mincks Amendment to the Schroeder Amendment, which will be explained in Number 7 below. This amendment would have stricken the dependency provision, that is allowing increased benefits on the basis of dependents and earnings in the Unemployment Compensation Law. This amendment would have based the benefit schedule solely on earnings.
- NUMBER 7**—The Schroeder Amendment, mentioned in Number 6 above, originally would have left the Unemployment Compensation Law as it was over the past several years, while increasing the maximum benefits in each category by a small amount. It would also have left the dependency provision in the law. With the adoption of Number 6 above, the variable maximum would have been retained in the law but the dependency provision was removed by the adoption of the Mincks Amendment.
- NUMBER 8**—The second Schroeder Amendment to House File 42. This amendment would have retained the variable maximum with dependents. It would have raised the maximums somewhat and placed them on a percentage of the average weekly wage in covered employment instead of the dollar maximum, as provided in the previous law.
- NUMBER 9**—House File 42, as finally amended by the Mincks Amendment. Provides for an unemployed individual to draw 58% of his average weekly earnings in the high quarter of the state average wage in covered employment which, in effect, means that anyone who has an average weekly wage of \$84 per week or more in his high quarter, would be eligible for the maximum, or \$49 per week as his weekly benefit amount.
- NUMBER 10**—House File 263, a Fair Employment Practices Law, which establishes a Fair Employment Practices Commission; provides for their appointment, and outlines their duties.
- NUMBER 11**—House File 677, the Union Shop Bill, which made it legal in Iowa for employers and representatives of their employees to negotiate Union Security Agreements, with the exception of Closed Shop Agreements.
- NUMBER 12**—The Conference Committee Report on Senate Joint Resolution 24. This is a Constitutional Amendment establishing the apportionment of both Houses of the Iowa Legislature on a population basis. This is the Permanent Reapportionment Plan.
- NUMBER 13**—Senate Concurrent Resolution 14, which was a resolution memorializing Congress to call a Constitutional Convention to amend the United States constitution to allow one House of a State Legislature to be apportioned on factors other than population. This is the Infamous Dirksen Amendment that is being considered by National Congress. If two-thirds, or 34 of the State Legislatures were to pass this resolution in a period of six years, it would require Congress to take this action.

EXPLANATION OF HOUSE VOTING RECORD

- NUMBER 1 — The same as Issue Number 5 on the Explanation of Senate Voting Record.
- NUMBER 2 — The Redfern Amendment to the Robinson Amendment to House File 42, the benefit bill on unemployment compensation, which would have reduced from 60% to 50% of the state average weekly wage as a maximum for unemployment compensation benefits.
- NUMBER 3 — House File 42, as amended by the House, which provided for 55% of the state average weekly wage in covered employment, plus \$3.00 per dependent up to a maximum of four dependents, as the maximum weekly benefit payable in unemployment compensation insurance.
- NUMBER 4 — House File 73. This bill would have provided that an injured employee would be allowed to choose his own doctor at the expense of the employer under the Iowa Workmen's Compensation Act.
- NUMBER 5 — House File 157, which would have provided that the prevailing wage in an area would be paid on all contracts for building where these buildings were being constructed with tax monies.
- NUMBER 6 — House File 254, the Wage Collection Law, which would allow the State Labor Commissioner to intervene, when requested to do so by a person, in the collection of wages due the person making the request.
- NUMBER 7 — Motion to Reconsider Issue Number 6 explained above.
- NUMBER 8 — House File 263, which was a Fair Employment Practices Act explained in Number 10 on the Explanation of Senate Voting Record.
- NUMBER 9 — House File 677, the Union Shop Bill, which was explained in Issue Number 11 on the Explanation of Senate Voting Record.
- NUMBER 10 — Senate Joint Resolution 24, which was the Constitutional Amendment apportioning both Houses of the Iowa General Assembly on population. This is the Permanent Reapportionment Plan.
- NUMBER 11 — Senate File 588, Redistricting of the Iowa General Assembly as explained in Issue 4 on the Explanation of Senate Voting Record.
- NUMBER 12 — Senate File 403, the Safety Bill explained in Issue 3 on the Explanation of Senate Voting Record.
